STILL, TO THIS DAY ... by Alan Cowan

Among lay-drivers, and frankly a lot of enthusiasts too, there is a primal confusion of the concepts of vibration, shocks and alignment. I think this must stem from an era when *service stations* at the roadside primarily offered these repairs, and sold the related tyres, and their attendants, at the durable age of fifteen, touted truths as though experts. In fact, they were as clear about them as they were the true purpose for Stonehenge. Passed down from a long line of inbred succession, we still have shops which specialize in tyres, the purchase of which is thoroughly muddled into discussions of vibrations, alignments, and shocks that modern sales reps finally understand ... not at all.

"My car always seems to need alignments ... this time it's for a vibration. Is there anything I can do differently?" I am asked. The first confusion: vibration and alignment are no more related than a cat to a windmill. Alignment won't fix a vibration, and a vibration won't result in mis-alignment. Alignment is making certain all four wheels (or paws) are pointed in the same direction. Vibration is caused by a dynamic imbalance, typically of some rotating part (like a broken windmill blade would do). No imbalance is affected when you point all the wheels in the same direction. And broken or missing windmill blades don't make cats walk crooked. It's like associating soup and bug-spray since they're available at the same store. Typically, low frequency vibrations in cars result from imbalanced tyres, one or more. If the vibration comes through the steering wheel, usually a front is the culprit, and if through your butt, usually a rear tyre or wheel. One often expressive way to identify a vibration as a tyre is to notice whether it fades in and gets worse, and then after a minute or two fades out and goes away, only to slowly return a short while later. This is because, a) no balance-job is perfect and all tyres have some imbalance remaining and, b) because no two wheels rotate at exactly the same speed. As the pair of tyres on an axle precess with respect to each other, their imbalances come into perfect agreement, vibrating badly, then slowly into position to perfectly cancel each other and the vibration disappears.

"The alignment before that was because I bought new tyres, and they said you always need alignment with new tyres." While many a worn-out tyre owed its last indulgence to an alignment-related problem, new tyres themselves do not require the vehicle be adjusted to suit them, as the argument would imply, any more than hip surgery is indicated when replacing a worn-out pair of pants. It is important, however, to have in place a mechanism for systematically monitoring tyre wear since this is usually the only tool we have to decide whether there is an alignment problem. If, for example, at each other service the treadwear is measured and recorded in a tabular format, patterns that emerge can be quickly addressed. Inner and outer edge wear — both tyres on one axle — shows under-inflation, regardless of recommended pressures (and center-wear: over-inflation). But if one or both outer edges alone, or one or both inner edges are beginning to wear, an alignment fault is indicated. (In the world of plausible failures it is rare that handling is affected before significant tyre wear could be measured.)

Still to This Day (Continued)

Yet let's avoid a trip to the tyre store for an adjustment just now, and consider what's up. While there is the very slow and steady shift of suspension components swimming rubber as items settle, which eventually justifies alignment adjustment, often an item (e.g. ball-joint or rod-end) has become worn enough to be in a state of rapid decay. It is important that we not change alignment settings to compensate for this sort of fluid thing. Indeed, once the offending part is replaced the alignment often doesn't need changing. So I'm suggesting a clear-cut process be followed: monitor treadwear, thoroughly check and repair suspension and steering components only when indicated, follow-up with an adjustment check by an alignment specialist.

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
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
