that, didn't you", our client asked. Perhaps a reasonable curiosity in this day and age, for the layperson unsure whether to trust a new mechanic's proposed course of action. I had to admit I had not. But it sure got me wondering, and in such curious state some Googling was in order: What does the collective mass know? Unfortunately, when involving car-stuff that usually leads to "the forums": places where truths, lies, egos, prattle and banter are not just blended, but are often inextricably alloyed. On car-stuff everyone's an expert. There I found that 'Land Rover Rick' had a huge following of folks all touting his solutions. No need to reason out — much less prove — why the suspension fuse blew. There's a very simple and cheap solution, he preaches, put in a larger fuse. Well, gosh, why didn't I think of that? Perhaps that's why I'm not an internet guru!

Decades ago, the 60-Minutes folks did an exposé on us auto mechanics. It really hurt the business. Certainly there are unscrupulous shops, but the method of the broadcaster's detective work brilliantly illustrated just why it is that we are solving the problems, and fixing things, instead of them. You see, their dragnet scheme seemed to them a tidy way of catching the crooks: they'd create a really simple problem on their fauxcustomer car, and see how much it cost to repair at various shops. The difficulty with this approach is that problems with machinery don't occur in a vacuum, and it is important to understand the background and cause of the problem if one is to know how — or whether — to affect a satisfactory repair. In the case of the exposé they removed a perfectly good heater blower fuse and substituted

abla}$ he diagnosis was on the table. "You did Google  $\,$  an utterly splattered, blown-out one in the circuit. Their prize-winning god-like mechanics simply put in a new fuse and sent them on their way for a dollar or two; their evil-doers, the bulk of their suspects, charged huge amounts of money trying to isolate the cause of the blown fuse, in an effort to truly repair the car. Of course since the car had no actual problem which had blown the fuse, no normal test revealed anything, and the more determined problem-solvers spent considerable effort sincerely searching for what was in fact a ghost — a lie — rather than admitting early-on they were stumped. Now if one of those techs were **really** good, he'd have solved the case correctly, albeit rather expensively, and proved that the fuse had indeed not blown in that car at all, but had been intentionally blown first and subsequently installed by a devious TV crew looking for mud for headlines.

> So in repair, in general, the problem is indeed often apparent, easy to see, or easy to find. And many DIYers are very comfortable making the fix. But many times the background of the failure is not so obvious, easy to identify, and the chance to ask somebody who may have that information tuckedaway in his grey cells would be nice. Your editor has decided that, while you could go to Land Rover Rick, one of the best benefits of a type-club is a ready source of disinfected, valid and relevant technical information. He has asked me to answer such questions on a monthly basis in the format of this column. Simply pose your technical questions to the editor, and he will pick one for publication. I promise not to use Google (or Siri) to find your results.


