Franklin Museum Tour

Saturday, March 16

Those of you that participated in the first two JCSA events of the year know what a good turnout we had and what a great time those participants had. Now those of you that missed either or both of our earlier events have an opportunity to join your fellow club members in another fun event. The club has set up a tour of the Franklin Automobile Museum followed by a lunch at the Union Pub, in St.

Phillips Plaza, where you will be ordering off the menu with separate checks.

The Franklin Automobile was produced from 1902 until the Great Depression, and around 150,000 cars were produced. They were considered a luxury car, and were novel in design because they were propelled by an air-cooled engine, instead of a water-cooled one. These cars were produced in

what is called the brass car era, because of all the brass fittings, specially the brass headlights. This museum is one of the most complete collections of Franklin Cars in the world. Those who have been to this museum before probably remember that there is a \$5.00 per person entry fee, but your JCSA board has decided that the club will pay the fees for all members attending the event.



And to add a little more fun to the event, we will be holding a poker rally from the starting of the drive to the museum and then onto the Pub. For those of you that don't know what a poker rally is; at certain designated stops each driver or navigator will get to pick one card from a face down deck offered to them. At the end of the drive, each car will assemble the best poker hand they

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My Hobby

This is the second article in the series "My Hobby", first started last month by Fred Secker. My hobby has nothing to do with water and sailing, but wood. I really started woodworking about 37 years ago while I was in the military, even though I grew up with it on a farm in Minnesota. I made a dining room table which has survived many, many moves across the country and several smaller ta-

bles and eventually even cabinets. If there ever was a tornado here, the table would be the ideal place to be under.

I started scroll sawing – using a saw with very tiny blades to do intricate cuts for wood and jewelry about seven or eight years ago. I cut many 2D pieces and that led to my interest in Intarsia - a 15th Century Italian art form in which low-relief wooden mosaic-type pieces are joined to create pictorial art. Beginning in 2007, I took a series of courses back in Tennessee taught by Judy Gale Roberts, the American artist who rediscovered Intarsia and introduced it to the United States in about 1980. I first started by doing several of her patterns and giving the pieces to family and friends. Judy primarily uses western red cedar, but



I use many different varieties to showcase the different grain patterns and colors. I do not use any stains or paints on my projects but only finish them with a hand rubbed clear satin varnish after sanding.

I now do a mix of projects on a commission basis. My projects are in several states and as far away as Germany. The pattern for one commission, the quitars pictured here, was re-

produced in a national woodworking magazine and has since been recreated by a few other woodworkers. Each project may take anywhere from as few as 10 hours to more than 100 hours to complete. They may have as few as 7 pieces (which I use for a beginning intarsia class that I teach at Woodcraft on Oracle Road) to a few hundred pieces. I now create my own patterns so it combines my interest in photography, computer use for the graphics and woodworking.

I find this hobby to be very relaxing and rewarding. If you have any interest or want to talk more about it, please give me a call or send me an email.

Electrical Theory by Joseph Lucas

Therefore, it follows that British electrical systems must leak smoke. Once again, the logic is clear and inescapable.

In conclusion, the basic concept of transmission of electrical energy in the form of smoke provides a logical explanation of the mysteries of electrical components especially British units manufactured by Joseph Lucas, Ltd.
