## My Jaguar Experience

Am the only person I know who has owned three Jaguar XK120s without making any money on any of them. My first was a 1954 XK120MC drophead coupe, the only one I ever saw. I was a student pilot at Reese AFB in 1957 when I traded my 1956 Oldsmobile for it. The Jag had less than 3000 miles and it was pristine. The young lady with whom I was involved at the time hated the car; she had a hard time driving it. In her defense, the 120s were little more than street-legal race cars. In any event, she persuaded me to trade the Jag in for a new Buick. Our relationship ended shortly thereafter; I tried to get the lag had a hard stready been

tried to get the Jag back, but it had already been sold. My second 120 was a 1954 OTS which I "bought"

in 1966 after returning from Vietnam. I only had this for a short time; it turned out that the person from whom I bought the car was not the de facto owner.

When Carol and I moved to Fairfax Virginia in 1977, I bought a 1972 XJ6 to be the family car. It served us well for several years

In about 1980 I discovered, covered with dust in the murky recesses of a body shop, my third XK120. It had been disassembled for a frame-off restoration but then abandoned by its owner. I bought it for chump change. It resided in our storage shed for a couple of years, my only progress in its restoration was to rebuild one of the SUs. I sold it when I was posted to the command of a remote base in eastern Turkey. Again, for chump change.

When we moved to California in the mid-1980s, we bought a series III XJ6. Big, heavy, fast, and nimble, it was probably Carol's favorite car.

Carol reluctantly traded the XJ6 for a new SAAB when, after several years it developed some water leaks, and we were Jag-less. I cured that problem by buying a 1976 XJS V-12 coupe. When we moved back to Virginia in 1998, we had one too many cars, so the Jag was sold.

After moving to Tucson in 2003 I bought my second XJS, this one a six-banger rag-top. I have always considered the XJS to be the most underrated car available.

In 2009, the wife of a close friend died in San Francisco. Since we were in Minnesota at the time, we did what seemed the most logical. We flew to Las Vegas where I bought the 2002 XK8 which I now have, drove to San Francisco for the funeral, drove it back to Minnesota, and then back here to Tucson. Seemed to make sense at the time.

So, eight Jaguars in 56 years. Wonder what will be next.

### Rancho Del Lago Golf Club

The Del Lago Golf Club is located in Vail which is about 15 miles Southeast of Tucson. The Vail area is growing rapidly and the Del Lago Golf Course lies at the heart of Rancho Del Lago which is a master planned community on the outskirts of Tucson.

Del Lago sits at an elevation of approximately 3400 feet and because it is higher in the mountains the temperature runs a little bit cooler than Tucson, maybe 5 degrees or so. This is a High Desert course with over 120 feet of elevation change over the course.

Del Lago starts out high and works it's way down the hillside into the valley below. The back nine runs along a large natural desert wash in which you may see many kinds of local wildlife, including Bobcats, Javalina, Deer and possibly even a Mountain Lion.

Del Lago is a player friendly course with only one forced carry off the first hole. The course features beautiful Mountain views in all directions and several lakes making Del Lago a pleasure to play.

**Driving Directions:** Take I-10 East from Tucson to the Vail-Wentworth exit (279). At the bottom of the off ramp go North on Vail Road for 3.5 miles. The Del Lago Golf Course is at the top of the hill on your left.

## JCNA Annual General Meeting, April 3rd-6th

ust over three years ago JANE's proposal was igcup accepted by JCNA to host the 2014 JCNA AGM. Over the next few years a committee of 25 members was formed to handle every detail to ensure that all attendees would have an enjoyable time. The committee started meeting once a month and in the last six months prior to the event the committee met once a week.

Many JANE members had attended previous AGM's and supplied the committee with lots of vital information. The Hyatt Regency in Cambridge was selected as the main venue. Over 30 Jaguar owners were contacted to enable us to have a comprehensive selection of cars for everyone to enjoy.

The display cars started to arrive early on Thursday morning. We built a ramp from the rear entrance directly into the main ballroom and laid down 3 sheets of heavy plywood to protect the ballroom carpet as the cars entered. The cars would come up the ramp and stop on the ply-wood, engines were then

turned off and the cars were pushed into position. All cars had carpet pads under each tire, and a sheet of poly underneath that went from front to rear.

On one side of the ballroom were Jaguar racing cars; D-Type, C-Type, XK-120, E-Types, and XJS. Along the back wall were a SS-100, MK-IV DHC, and a XK-150S OTS. Wrapping around the other side of the ballroom were XK-120's, F-Types, and E-Types. This was a spectacular display of 19 cars that remained in place for the entire weekend. JANE provided 24 hour security and had no issues with the cars. All cars were documented and insured, the value of them being over \$20m. In addition to the sports models in the ballroom there were 15 sedans on display in a dedicated area on the second floor of the Hyatt garage.

Friday featured tech sessions during the day; "Prepping Jaguars for Street Performance, Slalom and Racing", another tech session featured "Building a working example of a 1/3 scale Jaguar XK Engine". These tech sessions were oversold with standing room only once they started.

The evening kicked off with a "Welcome Party" at The MIT Museum, featuring wine and beer and served

hors d'oeuvres with a great exhibit called 'Driving Innovation'. The museum was fantastic with students explaining robots they built, holography, and numerous fascinating engineering projects.

Saturday was a day for delegates from all of the clubs to get their business done with delegate meetings throughout the day. For delegates and


> general attendees there were two more tech sessions: 'The Authenticity of Jaguar Tool Kits', and 'The Jaguar Parts Business' both well attended. The evening started with a cocktail party outside the ballroom and featured a silent auction with many Jaguar items to bid on. 
During dessert and coffee we


