WHAT IS OLD IS NEW AGAIN





Jaguar Classic is celebrating the 70th anniversary of the legendary C-type sports racer by creating a strictly limited production run of new C-type Continuation cars, which will be hand-built at the world-class Jaguar Land Rover Classic Works facility in Coventry, U.K. The C-type Continuation program will allow historic motorsports enthusiasts to purchase a factory-built example of the ultimate 1953 disc-brake-equipped "works" C-type directly from Jaguar, for the first time.

Jaguar is marking the 60th anniversary of the E-type sports car in 2021 with the introduction of a new limited-edition 575 hp V8 Supercharged F-TYPE Heritage 60 Edition. Just 60 examples of these all-wheel drive sports cars will be available for sale worldwide. A specially curated commemorative specification includes solid Sherwood Green paintwork, an original E-type color that hasn't been offered on a new Jaguar vehicle since the 1960s,




Day 3: Return to Tucson

Jaguar F-Type Preview: V-8 Only

Out of a handful of British car brands, Jaguar is the most prominent one. In fact, it won't be wrong to say that it defines Britain's sports car industry. The F-Type is their flagship sports car that sets the brand's approach towards sporty cars.





Unlike many mainstream performance-oriented brands, Jaguar has taken a nonconventional approach as far as the engine in their F-Type is concerned and it is evident by the fact that the 2022 F-Type in the U.S will only come with a V8 motor. No "small" engine-powered F-Types will be on sale and they have been discarded in favor of the fierce and exhilarating V8 power plant.

The availability of an RWD P450 is a great thing as it provides the freedom to enjoy and explore the car in a more traditionally dynamic way. The same is the case for the R version as far as the body style is concerned, though, its maximum power output is significantly higher than the P450 and is rated at 575-hp. The P450, on the other hand, puts out a maximum of 444-hp, which is a very respectable figure for a base variant sports car.

Both the 444-hp and 575-hp versions offer competitive performance in their class and a host of driver-assistive features make it easier to explore every RPM. The R version offers that pure track car DNA with a multitude of performance upgrades which enables it to clock 0-60 mph time of just 3.5 seconds and hit a top speed of 186 mph. The P450 doesn't lag far behind with a 0-60 mph time of 4.4 seconds and sprints until the speedometer hits 177 mph.

The 2022 F-Type carries the same visual appeal comprising sleek body lines together. The front grille and tail lamps further accentuate its effortless beauty and character. The P450 AWD version adds a host of cosmetic and creature comforts to the standard RWD variant which makes the pricier version a whole lot more attractive. Nonetheless, the R version, like always, will remain the #1 choice of Jaguar fans as it is the ultimate driving machine that delivers the signature punch and roar a Jaguar supercharged V8 is famous for.

LIGHTS, ACTION, CAMERA

On July 15, 1959, the first Jaguar Mark 2 saloon was produced. The Mark 2 gained a reputation as a capable car among criminals and law enforcement alike; the 3.8 Litre model being particularly fast with its 220 bhp (164 kW) engine driving the car from 0-60 mph (97 km/h) in 8.5 seconds and to a top speed of 125 mph (201 km/h) with enough room for five adults. Popular as getaway cars, they were also employed by the police to patrol British motorways. The Mark 2 is also well known as the car driven by fictional TV detective Inspector Morse played by John Thaw; Morse's car was the version with 2.4 L engine, steel wheels and Everflex vinyl roof. In November 2005, the car used in the television series sold for more than £100,000 following a total ground-up rebuild (prior to this, in its recommissioned state in 2002 after coming out of storage, it had made £53,000 at auction - £45,000 more than an equivalent without the history). In the original novels by Colin Dexter, Morse had driven a Lancia but Thaw insisted on his character driving a British car in the television series.



WOMEN DRIVERS!

On July 4, 1908, the first race for women drivers, the Ladies Bracelet Handicap, took place at the Brooklands track in Surrey. Eight women took part, with Muriel Thompson in her Austin finishing just ahead of Ethel Locke-King driving an Itala. Third was Christabel Ellis in an Arrol-Johnston. Apparently, the Brooklands Automobile Racing Club (now the British Automobile Racing Club) thought that this sort of thing was not at all appropriate, and banned women from driving at their meetings. There were no lady jockeys, so why should there be female racing drivers? went the BARC's thought process. The ban lasted until 1928. In 1932 women were allowed to compete against men. Jaguar Century: 100 Years of Automotive Excellence by Giles Chapman

A gorgeous, hardcover book, *Jaguar Century* is an illustrated retrospective examining 100 years of Jaguar. Automotive historian Giles Chapman showcases how company visionaries developed the brand in the trying economic times leading up to World War II before resetting Jaguar during England's bleak postwar years, first with its XK120, then the XK140 and XK150. Sporting saloons like the Mark 2 and Mark X established further standards for four-door luxury in the 1950s and '60s, while the stunning E-Type unveiled in 1961 became a holy grail of automotive design and gave Jaguar a genuine 150-miles-per-hour sports car. The story continues to the present, tracing all of Jaguar's ups and downs right up to the acclaimed all-electric I-PACE. Chapman also covers Jaguar's rich motorsport heritage, including open-wheel Formula 1 racers and the sports cars that went head-to-head with Ferrari, Porsche, and others at legendary circuits such as Le Mans over the decades.

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
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
